# **Commodore's Log**

Is it really June already? Rhetorical question. May was the club's busiest month so far this year, with consistently increasing member usage, snowbirds extending their stay because of great local weather and the return of the DJ Dance and Sunday Breakfast Buffet. A record 38 waitlist applicants became summer members — welcome! Amazingly, our waitlist, at 140 applicants, remains strong, and member turnover is in line with prior years.

Eight Bells for Ray Auger. Almost forty VBYC members and staff honored the life of the

club's much-loved bar manager, who passed on last year. It was a beautiful and moving service at St. Helen's Church, at which the priest gave Ray a much-deserved promotion from bar tender to "director of friendships," a role he lived with everyone!

**Food & Beverage.** In May, we also welcomed executive chef Rodney Smith into our VBYC family, and he wasted no time making an impact. Hiring F&B staff continues to be a challenge, given the general rebound of businesses in greater Vero, but we have several excellent additions to our server team.

**Reciprocals.** We have cautiously opened up to reciprocal clubs, but will limit the number of diners based on the projected nightly attendance and will prioritize patio seating to members and their guests. Shawn has secured a number of reciprocal relationships, and other clubs may open up if they solve current staffing challenges. So far, we have:

- Golf: Point West and Bent Pine
- Tennis: The Boulevard, Indian Trails and Sea Oaks
- Overnight Docking: most FCYC clubs
- Dining: all the above except Indian Trails, which doesn't have a restaurant

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# COVID GUIDELINES (Revised May 18, 2021)

These guidelines will apply to all regular and special cub events.

The mask requirement has been lifted for all members and guests who have been vaccinated. If you have NOT been vaccinated, we recommend that you wear a mask while indoors and until seated at your table.

If you have any symptoms or have been in contact with an infected person, please refrain from visiting the club and consult your physician. In accordance with Florida Laws and Regulations, by dining at the club, you and your guest(s) consent to cooperate with our contact tracing efforts, should you test positive for COVID19.

#### **INSIDE DINING ~ RESERVATIONS MANDATORY**

Walk-in, spontaneous bar seating in the Burgee room is now permitted.

Member Guests permitted. All guest names and phone numbers MUST be provided when making reservations.

- 1. Allowable seating ~ 50% of maximum occupancy or 144 members.
- 2. Seating at designated tables only, to ensure the 6 feet distancing requirement. Please do NOT add additional chairs.
- 3. Bar seating permitted.
- 4. Maximum members at a table (8) at those tables designed to accommodate 8 seats.
- 5. All gaming, card play is permitted.
- 6. Dancing is permitted, but please do not crowd the dance floor and keep 6' apart from other dancers.

#### **OUTSIDE DINING ~ RESERVATIONS MANDATORY**

Walk-in, spontaneous bar seating at the Tiki Bar is now permitted.

Member Guests permitted. Please provide names and phone numbers of all guests when making reservations.

- 1. Allowable seating ~ 100% of capacity with 6 feet between tables.
- 2. Seating at designated tables only, to ensure the 6 feet distancing requirement.
- 3. Bar seating permitted.
- 4. Maximum members at a table (8) only at tables that can accommodate up to 8 seats.
- 5. Masks are not required on the patio or in the Tiki bar.

# Filodivino Verdicchio, Castelli, 2019

Glass price \$5, Btl price \$15

This wine is made from 100% Vardicchio grapes, produced by Filodivino in the Marche region of central Italy. It is pale yellow, with almond and chamomile scents and ripe, yellow-fleshed fruit flavors. The mouth has a pleasant mineral feeling and soft fruity nuances. This wine combines well with pasta dishes, roast or grilled chicken and fish soups.

From the Lombardy region of northern Italy, this is a unique Pinot Noir, with a rich blackberry-raspberry fruit profile and notes of toasted oak and vanilla with a rounded, smooth finish. As with any Pinot Noir, this wine pairs well with lighter meats or heavier seafood (think Salmon), as well as poultry.

# **VBYC - A Model of Responsible Stewardship**

VBYC was chosen to receive the 2020 Environmental Business Award by a local environmental group, Keep Indian River Beautiful (KIRB). This group is a 501(c)3 non-profit and the mission is to enhance our community environment by beautifying neighborhoods and promoting sustainability. Accepting the award from Kristie Woodward are VBYC board members Judy Peschio and Sean Kashawlic.

VBYC has long recognized the importance of the health of our lagoon waters and the health of the plants and animals therein.

In 2013, VBYC invited Dr. Edie Widder of The Ocean Research & Conservation Association (ORCA) to speak at Skipper's Table about the health of our lagoon. She spoke about their Kilroy equipment, a water monitoring technology that allows scientists to monitor the Lagoon. VBYC, led by Woody Borman, committed to raising money to adopt a Kilroy. The City Marina manager, Tim Grabenbauer, agreed to let us put one on a day marker near the club. Adopting the Kilroy meant we were also responsible for taking care of it – a weekly chore that was not easy. A team of Richard and Annie Rogers, Tim Hermes, Toby Jarman, and some members of the Power Squadron worked along with the City Marina to keep the equipment running. The Kilroy was at that location for several years but eventually was moved to a location with greater need.

For over ten years, VBYC has been designated a "Clean Marina" as defined by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection. To obtain this designation status, facilities must meet all DEP legal regulatory requirements and implement at least 60% of voluntary best management practices, which include addressing critical environmental issues and emergency preparedness.



Beginning in summer of 2016, VBYC volunteers adopted Spoil Island – IR 25 and took on the responsibility of cleaning up and taking care of most of the island. In 2020, the group logged over 43 hours total cleanup time and collected 15 bags of trash weighing 80 pounds that included glass and plastic bottles, metal cans and a host of other surprises. The next cleanup date is Saturday, June 19. Please join us!

#### BRENDA AND RON RATCLIFF..... Remembering Life in Malaysia

Ron and Brenda arrived in Kuala Lumpur in the mid-90s where, after a year of intense preparation, Ron was assigned as the Naval Attaché at the US Embassy to represent US Navy interests in Malaysia. Almost immediately after arriving, Brenda was hired to teach at the International School. Brenda called this time the "Princess Era," as they benefited from live-in staff who helped

with their considerable entertaining duties, which were a central part of attaché life.

The sensory overload one experiences in any Asian city was ever-present in Kuala Lumpur (KL to the locals). KL was rapidly transforming from a quaint sleepy city with Kiplingesque wide Banyan-treed boulevards into a bustling metropolis with giant skyscrapers springing up everywhere and roads changing overnight. Learning how to drive a car with the steering wheel on the right side of the car while obeying the British system of driving on the left side of the road was always a challenge. The chaotic, anything goes, approach Malaysians took to traffic laws along with motorcycles darting in and out of traffic made getting anywhere an adventure. Scrapes and dents were a simple fact of life.

One of the great pleasures in such a diverse country was the wide variety of food in restaurants and the innumerable food stalls that were seemingly everywhere. Just about every kind of food was available in KL and, unlike many countries in Asia, it was generally safe to eat. Given the multi-cultural nature of Malaysia, holidays were frequent and celebrated by all with food being the central focus.



#### DOUG & DEB ALEXANDER..... Commuting in Asia

In 1949 Deb's family was transferred from NYC to the Philippines by AIG, an international insurance company. The entrance to Manila Bay reduced her mother to tears as the ship wove through the sunken hulks of abandoned results of a war-torn country. Starving Filipino families lived on these relics, their laundry hanging on the rusted iron beams. During the next ten years it

was gratifying to see the steady transformation of a beautiful country brought back to life with American assistance.

When Deb left Asia, she had no idea she would be returning. Years later, she and husband Doug were transferred to Japan, supposedly for a few years. These few years turned into twelve.

The commute to work by subway provided untold experiences. But the day Deb wore her new fur coat, recently purchased in Seoul, on the train takes first prize. She entered the car with several other people and would endure four very embarrassing stops until her destination was reached. Once the door closed and the overhead fans started whirring the car was filled with fur from her bargain sale coat. At every stop thereafter the scene was repeated. When they reached the final stop, Deb was mortified; but not one person scowled or said an unkind word. As they exited the train, they turned in her direction and slowly bowed.

#### TOBY & JO ANN JARMAN.... Around the World and Back

Toby and Jo Ann's high school sweetheart song was "Moon River." Ironically, the song's lyric, "Two drifters off to see the world," would be a roadmap for their adventurous lives.

From 1972-77, Toby worked in the Honolulu office of Congress' Government Accountability Office. Avoiding family separation with annual travel of seven

months, Jo Ann and sons traveled with Toby to 22 countries including Thailand, Japan, Korea, Hongkong, Philippines, Australia, New Zealand and Turkey.

Later, Toby joined the State Department with a six-year tour in Kenya, which included 28 countries in East Africa and the Middle East. Jo Ann served as the Mogadishu Liaison Officer in Nairobi and when neighboring Somalia fell in 1991, was responsible for coordinating logistical needs of evacuating all American employees and families.

Toby retired in 2002 as Minister-Counselor of the Foreign Service after traveling to over 100 countries; he and his family traveled around the world three times.



#### Budd and Sue Buschmann ..... There's Always time for a Safari

Budd and Sue grew up, went to school, and married on Long Island. While serving in the Air Force, Budd was posted to Germany where they discovered their love of travel. On returning home, they realized commuting into NYC was not for them, so Budd took a job with Texaco, starting his career in international human resources. Raising their two daughters in Coral Gables,

FL, Budd traveled often to Europe, Africa, and the Caribbean. With both girls grown, Sue and Budd had the opportunity to take an overseas assignment and spent three wonderful years in London! Retiring from Texaco at 56, Budd took a job in Equatorial Guinea on the west coast of Africa as HR Director with a petrochemical company. Rotating three months in country and one month home, with travel through Paris, gave them the chance to discover places and people they never imagined growing up on Long Island. Eight years of traveling back and forth provided them opportunities to see Europe and Africa and take the family on safari.

#### Piero Sferlazzo.... My Little Story

Piero was born in Alexandria, Egypt and lived there until he was eight years old. He grew up in Florence, Italy, and in 1981 came to the US to attend graduate school with the plan to stay two years. The common thread all through the years was spending summers in Maremma, the coastal region in southern Tuscany which was his mother's home. Maremma is famous for its beaches, Etruscan hill towns, cowboys and long horned cows; before drainage of the coastal swamps, the area also was known for mosquitos, and malaria. The Maremma of the 50s and 60s was a wonderful relic of a bygone era. Life was punctuated by the changing of the seasons with ritual family gatherings centered around food and its procurement: fishing, porcini, blackberries, escargots, and the family pig in January. Maremma has changed. The beaches are crowded and overbuilt, the fish is scarce, but fortunately porcini are still abundant, and it is still the best place to spend the summer.






